Notice: Please read this guide before setting up the WebLook server. The WebLook server will not run until the following configuration items are correctly setup. These are the minimum configuration settings needed to operate.

WebLook v6.0

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I. Overview

WebLook is a server-based product that will serve drawings, images and web pages to end-users on an Intranet or the Internet. WebLook supports the viewing of a number of CAD and raster file types in their native formats. These include AutoCAD, MicroStation, SolidWorks, Cadkey, Inventor, ME 10/30, DXF, HPGL, TIFF and more.

WebLook offers two separate interfaces: The first is an ActiveX, which is downloaded and installed on the client. In operation, drawings and images are accessed through a Web browser or an ActiveX host application, such as Visual Basic. The WebLook client requests a drawing from the WebLook server through an IP/Port combination specified during the server installation. When a file is viewed there is no file transferred, but rather data is streamed directly to our client via our exclusive Direct Connect Technology.

The second interface is designed to run in IIS as an ASP.NET application that needs no client download. This application uses the combination of ASP, JavaScript and CSS to create a user-friendly interface. The WebLook server creates an image of the drawing that can be viewed natively in the browser. This is a view only application and does not support redlining functions.

WebLook has the additional capability to serve HTML and associated files, such as GIF, JPEG, PNG, CSS, JS, etc., to the client. WebLook also offers support for PHP scripts. This allows WebLook to become much more than a drawing server.

The ability to redline is available as an optional Redline Module, which is sold separately. This module will allow the WebLook ActiveX to markup and annotate drawings and images. The redline files may then be saved to the server to share with others.

II. Initial Setup

Step 1

Insert the CD-ROM into your CD-ROM drive. The AutoRun dialog will automatically appear if you have this feature enabled. If the AutoRun dialog does not appear, run the SETUP.EXE located in the root of the CD-ROM.

Step 2

The wizard will first ask what folder to use as the program folder. The default folder is called WebLook5, but an alternate folder may be specified if so desired.

Step 3

Those installing WebLook on a machine capable of running a Service will be asked if WebLook should be installed as a service or to be run as a normal program. Installing as a Service will allow WebLook to be run automatically on the startup of the server. If you elect to run WebLook as a normal program the wizard can place an icon in the Startup directory, but you will need to logon to the machine to run WebLook.

Step 4

The wizard will allow the selection of a program group to place the program icons. The default selection is a new group named WebLook 6. If you are not installing as a Service and it is desired to have WebLook automatically run on the startup of the server, check the option "Always Run WebLook on Startup" before proceeding to the next step.

Step 5

WebLook supports PHP scripting language. The wizard will ask you to check if you wish to install this option.

Step 6

WebLook has been installed. Choose the "Configure the WebLook Server Now" option in order to make the configuration settings needed to run the server. Press the Finish button to complete the installation process and the WebLook Configuration Dialog will open.

Step 7

The information needed to configure WebLook is included in more detail in the following sections of the Installation Guide. Remember to start the server after the configuration is complete.

III. Server Configuration

All WebLook server administration is done through the WebLook Monitor. The WebLook Monitor gives the administrator a snap shot of who is accessing the server in real time. The monitor will list each user currently connected to the server. The administrator has the ability to remove a specific connection by highlighting the connection entry and pressing the Remove User button.

Accessing Monitor - The Monitor may be accessed from the WebLook program folder. If WebLook is not running as a service, you may right-click on the WebLook icon in the system tray and choose Run Monitor/Config Program when the server is running.

Note: Connection vs. License – Each instance of the client ActiveX or ASP.NET application will initiate a connection to the server. A single machine may have multiple connections, but will use only one license. For example, if a user is viewing multiple images, either in different browsers or multiple images embedded on a single web page, he will only be using one license.

In addition to monitoring users, both the WebLook Configuration and Log Window are accessed from the File menu

Configuration - The Configuration dialog is used to add, edit and delete WebLook Sites, change the standard settings for the server, and setup users' permissions.

Log Window - The Log Window displays the errors, connection and status information in real-time. You may set the level of logging you wish to capture by changing the **Logging Level** option in the Communications Tab of the Configuration Dialog.

Log Files - WebLook also creates log files, in the form of text files. These files are located in the **Logs** subdirectory located under the WebLook program directory.

A. Communications Tab

The Communications tab in the WebLook Configuration dialog allows you to create, edit or delete a site. Creating a WebLook site does not create content, but merely references a directory structure from which to publish the content.

Adding a WebLook Site

1. Press the Add Site button to get started. The WebLook Sites dialog box is presented.

- 2. Type the name of your site in the **Description** box. This name is simply a convenient way for you to discern between multiple sites.
- 3. Click on the dropdown box labeled **IP Address** to get a list of the IP addresses installed on your server. Choose the IP you wish WebLook to bind.

Hosting Multiple Web Sites

To create and host multiple Web sites, you must first ensure that each site has a unique identification. To accomplish this, you will need to either obtain multiple IP addresses or assign a unique port to each site.

4. Type in the **TCP Port** number. In operation, the WebLook Server will be listening on this IP/Port combination.

Note: Port 80 is the default port and gives you the advantage of not having to specify a port when requesting a file to view, because the browser assumes the default when no port is specified. However, if this same server is running an IIS service (Web service for HTTP communications) listening on Port 80, you must use another port number. We recommend that you use Port number 55555. You will need to specify this port in the request for the file. As an example, a link or embed in a HTML page will consist of the host IP address followed by a colon and the port number that you have chosen (http://IPAddress:55555/columbia.dwg.ifl).

5. Choose the location of the **Default Directory** by typing or browsing to the directory that contains, or will contain, the site content. When you specify a default directory for a WebLook Site or a Virtual Directory, the specified directory and all subdirectories will be published. The directory must be located either on the server or on a machine that may be accessed by the server. A request that comes to WebLook on the IP and Port combination specified for the site will be resolved to the default directory path.

When WebLook is installed as a service

A service is defaulted to use the System account when it is installed. The System account is just fine as long as the drawings you wish to serve are local to the WebLook server. A System account cannot access non-local drives. Therefore, if you wish to serve non-local files when running WebLook as a service, you must use the Services Control Manager to change the account for the WebLook service to something other than the System account. The account you use must have full privileges to the WebLook directory and the Windows Temp directory as well as read privileges to the drawing directories.

Serving drawings located on another server

If the drawings you wish to serve are located on a non-local drive that requires a login, WebLook must login while connecting to that drive. When choosing to connect through a share on another computer, you must give WebLook the User Name and Password for each login that is required. You must use a UNC path for the drawing directory if you wish WebLook to properly log in.

- 6. Please refer to the section on Virtual Directories for an explanation.
- 7. Next, you must setup your security for the site by accessing the Security tab.

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8. In the **Type of files to serve** section you must tell WebLook whether you wish to serve WebLook files only or Additional file types.

WebLook files are the drawing and images files WebLook supports, which will be served to the WebLook client.

File types that WebLook views:

Additional files are those files you wish WebLook to serve directly to the browser and can be any file, such as HTML, PHP, GIF, JPEG, etc.

- If you have chosen Additional files, specify the exact file extensions of the files you wish WebLook to serve. This list is to be typed in the Additional file types to allow box. Each file extension is to be separated by a comma.
- Type into the Default Web Page box the name of the web page you wish
 WebLook to automatically present to the user when he accesses this WebLook
 Site if no file was specified. This is optional.
- 3. Choose the option **Allow anonymous access to this resource**, if you do not wish to force users to login. This will place the Guest user into the box below and will cause all users, not logged in, to utilize the rights specified by the Guest account.

- Allow specific user accounts access to the site by clicking Add and choosing an account. To create user accounts in the first place you must do so in the User tab. Refer to the section of this manual entitled "Adding a New User."
- 5. After you have added a user account you may change the rights by highlighting the account name and pressing the **Edit** button. The dialog box shown below will allow you to change the user's permissions for this resource. These changes are only for this resource and will not effect this user's default permissions, as defined in the User tab, or this user's permissions for any other resource.

Virtual Directories

In most cases, the content you publish to your WebLook site is located in the Default Directory. But there may be instances when the content is located somewhere else or it may be that your web pages are in a separate directory from your drawing files.

To publish from any directory not contained within your Default Directory, you can create a virtual directory. The virtual directory will appear to client browsers as though it were a subdirectory of the Default Directory. Publishing a virtual directory allows access to that specific directory and all subdirectories under it.

 Press the Add button located in the Virtual Directories section of the WebLook Sites dialog to get started. The Virtual Directory dialog box is presented.

2. In the **Alias** box, type a name for the virtual directory. This is the name the user types in the client application, and should be short and easy to type.

- 3. In the **Local Directory** box, type or browse to the physical directory that is to be published.
- 4. Click on the **Security** tab to setup permissions for access to this directory.

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The instructions for completing this section are similar to those in the section on adding a WebLook Site above, with one main difference. You may elect to apply the user permissions you have already set for the site to this virtual directory.

5. Click OK

Editing a WebLook Site

You may edit an existing WebLook Site from the Communications Tab.

- 1. Select the name of the WebLook Site you wish to edit.
- 2. Press the Edit Site button.
- 3. Make your changes using the same dialog boxes described above.

Delete a WebLook Site

You may delete an existing WebLook Site from the Communications Tab.

- 1. Select the name of the WebLook Site you wish to delete.
- 2. Press the Delete Site button.

B. Users Tab

Utilize the Users tab to create user accounts and to specify the default rights for each account. You must specify security settings for each of the WebLook Sites and Virtual Directories you create. That is, you will need to specify who has access to these resources. You have the option of allowing Anonymous Access, through the Guest account, or to create user accounts in this tab.

In practice, each WebLook Site and Virtual Directory can have its own set of users and each of those users may have different permissions. When you add a user to a Site's Security tab it will have the rights you specify as default in this tab. You may subsequently alter those rights at the Site level. Altering rights at the Site level will not affect the default rights.

The WebLook Server has a number of permissions that may be configured when it is desirable to limit access to these various functions. Also, if you are deploying the optional Redline Module, you must create accounts.

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Adding a New User

1. Press the Add User button to get started. The User Settings dialog box is presented.

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- 1. In the **User Name** box, type a name for this user. This is the name the user types into the login dialog if required. It is also the name used to differentiate redline files if you are using the Redline Module.
- 2. In the **Password** box, type a password for this user to use to login.
- Place a checkmark next to each permission you wish to grant to this user in the Default Permissions section of the dialog. A check next to the right denotes that this right is enabled for the user.

Permission Rights

Printing -Allows the user to Print the image currently viewed.

Layer Manipulation - Allows access to the Layer Dialog that will allow the user to manipulate the layers in a CAD drawing for viewing purposes.

View Redline - View any redline files associated with the current image.

Browse Files and Folders – Specifically used to give the ASP.NET interface the right to browse and display in the interface the files and folders specified as default directories for the site or virtual directories.

Allow commands to be executed that are not on client right-click menu - A host, such as Internet Explorer or Visual Basic, may send commands to WebLook by issuing commands to the WebLook client. By default, the server will only accept those commands listed in the client right-click menu. This prevents someone from accessing commands that you have not authorized. If you wish to allow a user to issue all commands, enable this option.

Create/Edit Redline* - Client user may create, edit and save a redline file to the server.

Red Preference Config* - Client may change the Redline Preferences on the Redline file served down from the server.

* Must have WebLook Redline Option for these to apply.

C: Client Menu Setup

A whole host of commands are available to allow the client to manipulate the viewing of the image. These commands are accessed through a context menu that will appear when the client-side user clicks the right mouse button in the drawing window. The server controls the contents of the context menu. All users will receive the exact same context menu defined at the server. If the client does not have permission to utilize a specific command that is included in the menu, the command will still appear in the menu, but will be disabled for that user.

The commands that are available for inclusion in the menu are listed in a box on the left side of the dialog. The commands that are already part of the menu are listed on the right.

To define a menu, follow these steps:

1. Choose whether you wish to add commands to the Right Click menu or the Redline Sub-Menu.

Right Click Menu - The Right Click Menu is for general commands and is accessed by the user by clicking the right mouse button in the WebLook drawing window.

Redline Sub-Menu – Only contains redline tools and is accessed from the Redline Tools menu item, which appears at the bottom of the Right Click Menu when Redline Edit is enabled.

- 2. Highlight the command you wish to add from the left list. Highlight the point in the list on the right where you wish to insert the command. You may choose whether to Insert Before or Insert After the insertion point. Press the Add button.
- 3. If you wish to remove an item, highlight the item in the right list and press Remove. You may wish to Remove All and start with an empty list. If at anytime you wish to return to the default menu, press Default.
- 4. Press OK to update the lists.

Menu Commands Definitions:

Printing - WebLook uses your standard Windows printer drivers when printing or plotting. To print the drawing or image that you are currently viewing, simply select the Print command from the right-click context menu. Advanced features, such as Text Stamping and adjustment of Line Widths, even using an ACAD.PCP file, may be set at the server.

View Redlining - You must turn the viewing of redlining on before WebLook will display the redline files. If redline files exist for the currently viewed drawing or image on the server, it will be overlaid on the screen automatically. There may be multiple redline files for any particular drawing. A user may turn on or off the viewing of these other redline files using this command. See Redline File List.

Redline File List - WebLook will automatically display all redline files available for the currently viewed drawing. To allow the users the ability to turn on and off specific redline files include the Redline File List. Accessing this command will present the user with a list of the available redline files.

Turn Off - When a redline file is added or created it is automatically visible. To turn off the visibility of a specific redline file(s), simply highlight the name of the file and either press the Turn Off button or right-click and choose Turn Off from the pop-up menu. You may also double-click on the filename to toggle between On and OFF. A checkmark will appear in front of the filename if it is currently visible.

Turn On - To make a redline file visible, simply highlight the name of the file and either press the Turn On button or right-click and choose Turn On from the pop-up menu. You may also double-click on the filename to toggle between On and Off. A checkmark will appear in front of the filename if it is currently visible.

Show ViewMarks - The Show ViewMarks command presents a dialog box for the user to use an existing ViewMark. The list holds the names of all ViewMarks associated with the currently viewed drawing.

Zoom to Marker - 1) Choose the desired ViewMark by clicking on the name in the list. 2) Press the Zoom to Marker button to cause WebLook to zoom to the ViewMark. Use F11 and F12 keys to automatically zoom to the next and previous ViewMarks in the list.

Properties of Marker - 1) Choose the desired ViewMark by selecting the name from the list. 2) Press the Properties button to display the properties of the ViewMark. If this is one of your ViewMarks, and you are currently in Redline Edit Mode, this button will become Edit Properties and you will be allowed to change the properties. 3) If you are editing the ViewMark, remember to Save File To Server to change the server copy of the file.

Delete Marker - 1) Choose the desired ViewMark by selecting the name. 2) If this is one of your ViewMarks, and you are currently in Redline Edit Mode, you will be allowed to delete the ViewMark. Press the Delete button to delete the ViewMark. 3) To delete the ViewMark, remember to Save File To Server to change the server copy of the file.

Edit Redlining - To edit a redline file, you must first choose Edit Redlining from the redline menu. If you have permission from the server to redline, you will be allowed to create and edit redline entities.

When you enter redline mode the menu item Redline Tools, defined at the server, will appear at the bottom of the Right Click Menu. Utilize this command to access the tools in the Redline Sub-Menu.

Zoom Extents - Zoom Extents will scale the image to fit the size of the drawing window. In the case of CAD files, the extents used will be the extents stored in the CAD drawing. WebLook will use the bounds of the bitmap as the extents for raster files.

Zoom In 50% - Use this command to zoom in. WebLook calculates the zoom factor based on the images zoom scale. The new view is enlarged to double the current size.

Zoom Out 50% - Use this command to zoom out. WebLook calculates the zoom factor based on the images zoom scale. The new view is a 50% reduction.

Zoom Previous - Choosing the Zoom Previous command will retrace your zoom and pan actions by displaying the view you had prior to the last zoom or pan. You can continue this process by reselecting this command until the original view is displayed.

Zoom to Limits - The Zoom to Limits command is only available for .DWG format files. It reads the limits stored in the current drawing and then sets the zoom scale so that the limits of the drawing fit within the drawing window.

Layers – The Layer command brings up a dialog box containing all the layers found within the current drawing. The status of each layer, whether it is On or Off, will appear to the left of the layer name under the heading On. WebLook interprets a setting of Frozen or Off to mean the layer is off or not viewable. The color of the layer is displayed at the left of each layer name.

Double-clicking the layer name will toggle the On/Off status of a single layer. You can also change the status of multiple layers by highlighting multiple layers and then pressing the Turn On or Turn Off buttons.

Default Layer Configuration - Many CAD formats have the ability to store entities on various layers or levels. This ability is used many times to segregate certain components of the drawing, such as electrical entities from structural entities.

WebLook allows a user to turn the visibility of specific layers off and on through the Layer command. This is useful when a user wishes to view only certain layers.

Our FastLook product has the capability to take this one step further. A series of "default" layer configurations may be saved for later use. These layer configurations must be created by the Administrator and placed on the server for use by the clients.

The Default Layer Configuration command will list the Layer Configurations that are saved on the server. To use one of the layer configurations, click on the configuration name and press "OK" or double-click on the configuration name. WebLook will then regenerate the drawing as defined by the configuration. The default layer configuration

picked will remain in effect for every drawing viewed thereafter in the current session until changed. If you wish to turn off the use of a default layer configuration, pick the top entry entitled "No Default". You may also delete, edit or rename a configuration from this dialog box.

Stored Views - If you have predefined views stored within your CAD drawing, the Stored Views command will bring up a list of those views. To use one of the stored views, click on the view name and press "OK" or double-click on the view name. WebLook will then regenerate the drawing as defined by the stored view.

Pan - Pan is used to slide a drawing on the screen. You could use this command to bring a previously unseen portion of the drawing inside the window. When you Pan, you slide the drawing and not the window. You specify the amount the drawing must be moved by entering a "from" point and a "to" point. The drawing will be moved so that the "from" point now coincides with the "to" point. Pan mode is indicated when the pointer changes to a box with four arrows pointing in opposite directions.

Paper Space/Layouts - The Paper Space/Layout command is only available for those files that contain paper space or layout capabilities. The toggle will reflect the current ACAD Space View Mode specified at the server. Using the Paper Space/Layout command will change the view of the current drawing. If multiple layouts exist, WebLook will present a dialog from which the user can choose the desired layout.

Rotate - WebLook allows CAD and scanned drawings to be rotated on the screen using the Rotate command from the context menu. "Clockwise" rotates the image in 90 degree increments in the clockwise direction. "Counter Clockwise" does the same in the opposite direction. You may also specify a specific position, i.e. 0, 90, 180 and 270 degrees, relative to the original position of the image.

Gray Scale Toggle -There may be certain instances where an image would be better viewed in gray scale. Simply view the image and choose the Gray scale Toggle

command in the context menu. This command will remain modal until it is selected again.

Monochrome Vector Mode - The Monochrome Vector command will display all color vectors as either black on a white background, or white on a black background, depending on the color of the background.

Invert Black and White Raster - There may be certain instances where a raster image would be better viewed if its color was inverted. WebLook will allow the user to invert many black and white raster images for viewing purposes. Simply view the image and choose the Invert Black & White Raster command in the context menu. The black portions of the image will be turned to white, and the white portions will be black.

Contrast - Utilizing the Contrast command may enhance many raster images. This command will allow the user to specify four different settings from Lightest to Darkest.

First Page, Next Page, Previous Page, Last Page, Go To Page - WebLook has the ability to view multi-page TIFF documents. These are the commands to page through a document.

Redraw - To manually refresh the image, choose the Redraw command under the context menu. This may be necessary if some process has covered the image or altered it in any way. If you are inside a browser, using the browser's refresh command will cause you to totally restart your current session.

Get Block Attribute - WebLook has the ability to retrieve block attributes that are associated with blocks in an AutoCAD drawing. The Get Block Attribute command puts WebLook in entity pick mode. This will change the cursor to a pick box. Place the box over a block entity and click the left mouse button. WebLook will then present the associated block attributes in a list box.

Get Extended Data - WebLook also has the ability to retrieve extended entity data which is associated with entities in an AutoCAD drawing. The Get Extended Data command

puts WebLook in entity pick mode. This will change the cursor to a pick box. Place the box over an entity and click the left mouse button. If the entity picked has extended data, WebLook will present it in a list box.

Get Object Data - WebLook has the ability to retrieve object data that is associated with entities in an AutoCAD drawing. The Get Object Data command puts WebLook in entity pick mode. This will change the cursor to a pick box. Place the box over an entity and click the left mouse button. If the entity picked has object data, WebLook will present it in a list box.

Get Database Links - WebLook has the ability to retrieve SQL links that are associated with blocks in an AutoCAD drawing. The Get Database Links command puts WebLook in entity pick mode. This will change the cursor to a pick box. Place the box over an entity and click the left mouse button. WebLook will then present the SQL link information in a list box if a link is found.

Identify Entity - WebLook has the ability to retrieve information about an entity that has been visually picked on the screen. To place WebLook in entity pick mode simply choose the Identify Entity command. This will change the cursor to a pick box. Place the box over the entity and click the left mouse button. WebLook will then present the associated information in a list box. The typical information displayed is entity name, layer name, entity handle, and insertion point of the entity, x-y-z scale factors and the rotation angle.

Linking Commands – WebLook has the capability to utilize the Hyper-Links created in FastLook Plus. The following two commands can be used to go back to a previous link.

Go to Previous Link - Each time you click on an image link icon, the current drawing name is stored before jumping to the linked file. Go to Previous Link allows you to move backward through the chain of links, one link at a time, all the way back to the first file. Choosing another file to view from the drawing menu breaks the chain of links and grays this command.

Go to First Link - If you have followed a chain of image links, this command will send you directly back to the first file.

Redline Commands – The following commands are to be placed on the Redline Sub-Menu and are used to mark-up drawings and images. You must have the optional Redline Module to utilize this capability.

Redline Leader Note - You must specify the start and end points of the leader line. The start point is the arrow end of the leader line and the end point is the text end. After specifying the two endpoints, WebLook will bring up a dialog box for you to enter your text.

Type in as many lines of text as desired in the box labeled Note Text. Specify the layer on which to place the note. Specify the text height, font style, arrow size and color of the entity. Choose "OK" to place the text on the drawing.

Redline Line - This will place a single line on the drawing at any angle and length. Specify the start point by clicking the left mouse button. Then move the rubber banding line to the desired position and click the left mouse button to specify the end point.

Redline Note - This command will place a single text note. Each note can contain as many lines as you desire. Simply click the left mouse button at the point where you would like the text note to appear. The Redline Notes dialog box will appear. Enter the desired text, text height, font style, and rotation angle, and press "OK".

Redline Box - This command will place a single rectangle on the drawing. Specify the start point by clicking the left mouse button. Then move the rubberbanding box to the desired position and click the left mouse button. **Redline Circle** - This command will place a single circle on the drawing. Specify the center point by clicking the left mouse button. Then move the rubber-banding circle to the desired position and click the left mouse button.

Redline Arc - This command will place a single arc on the drawing. You have the choice between three different styles of creating an arc.

3 Point - Specify the starting point by clicking the left mouse button. Then specify the mid point by clicking the left mouse button. Move the rubber-banding arc and click the left mouse button again to establish the end point of the arc.

Center, Start, End - Specify the center point by clicking the left mouse button. Then move the rubber-banding circle to the desired diameter and click the left mouse button again. This establishes the starting point of the arc. Now move the arc and click the left mouse button once more to establish the end point of the arc.

Start, End, Radius - Specify the starting point by clicking the left mouse button. Then move the rubber-banding line to the desired ending point and click the left mouse button again. Now move the rubber banding line to create the desired radius of the arc and click the left mouse button.

Redline Polyline - This command will place a series of connected lines (or polyline) on the drawing. Specify the starting point by clicking the left mouse button. Then, when you move the mouse, a rubber-banding line will follow the pointer. Mark the end of one line and the start of another by clicking the left mouse button. Continue clicking in this fashion to draw your polyline. You may end your polyline several ways. To leave it open-ended, you can click the right mouse button, or press the letter "E". FastLook will automatically close your polyline if you press the letter "C". Press the ESC key to abort the polyline.

Redline Cloud - This command will place a cloud on the drawing. Specify the center point by clicking the left mouse button. Then move the rubber banding cloud to the desired position and click the left mouse button.

Redline Sketch - This command allows you to draw freehand shapes on the drawing. Specify the starting point by clicking the left mouse button, and then move the cursor in the desired pattern. You may end your Sketch several ways. To leave it open-ended, you can click the left mouse button, or press the letter "E". FastLook will automatically close your Sketch if you press the letter "C". Press the ESC key to abort the Sketch.

Insert Symbol - This command allows you to place predefined Symbols in the redline drawing. A dialog box appears that shows a list of the Symbols to choose. Clicking in the list of symbol names will display the image of the symbol in the dialog's picture box.

Hatching - Selecting Hatch produces an entity which displays a hatch pattern. You may place this entity within the boundaries of any closed redlining entity you wish, including Circles and Clouds. Multiple entities may be selected prior to hatching.

Hatch Pattern - You may choose between eighteen (18) different hatch patterns. Select the type of hatch pattern you wish to use by accessing the Hatch Pattern command from Redline-Edit.

D: Accuracy Tab

WebLook allows the administrator the ability to control many of the factors that affect the quality and accuracy of the image sent to the client. This tab contains options that affect the accurate display of vector drawings, such as AutoCAD, MicroStation, Cadkey and others. All support files that are external to a CAD file itself, such as fonts and external reference files, must be referenced here. Those files must either reside on the server or must be accessible through the LAN.

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Using CAD Fonts - Check the Use CAD Fonts option to use the CAD fonts referenced in the current drawing. Type the directory path in the box provided. If you do not specify a path, WebLook will use the FastLook font.

Setting a Path to the Fonts

The CAD Font Path is used to specify where WebLook should look to find the shape or font files that are needed by the CAD drawing files that reference them. You can enter multiple path designations in the Cad Font Directory field in the

Accuracy tab. For example, if you wanted WebLook to search two directories for your font files, C:\ACAD and C:\DRAWINGS, you would enter in both paths delimited by a semicolon as shown below.

C:\ACAD;C:\DRAWINGS

DGN users should specify the path and file name of the font library in the DGN Font Library path, also located in Directory.

Displaying External References - If your CAD drawing contains external block references, you must specify where WebLook should look to find external reference files with the Reference File Path field in the Accuracy tab. You can enter multiple path designations in the field by entering each path delimited by a semicolon.

Using CAD Line Types - This option causes WebLook to use the line type definitions stored in the current CAD drawing file.

Display Fills - WebLook will display area fills such as wide polylines or filled polygons if the Display Fills option is checked.

Display Paper Space - If your drawing was in paper space the last time you saved it in AutoCAD, WebLook will display it in paper space if the Display Paper Space option is On. Turning Paper Space Off will cause WebLook to switch to model space. This is the same effect as setting Tile mode to 1 in AutoCAD.

Using the 16 Color Palette – This will force WebLook to use a 16-color palette.

Display All CAD Attributes - Attributes that are attached to a block in AutoCAD can be either visible or invisible. WebLook normally only displays the attributes that have been assigned a visible setting, however, you can force WebLook to display all attributes, regardless of their visibility setting by checking this option.

ACAD Space View Mode - There are three options available to configure the manner in which WebLook will present the initial view.

Last Saved - If you wish for the drawing to open in the same view as it was last saved it in the CAD package, choose the Last Saved option.

Force Paper Space - Force Paper Space/Layout will cause WebLook to present the first layout or sheet.

Force Model Space - Force Model Space will cause WebLook to present the view in model space.

Default View for DGN Files - Specify the view in which WebLook first presents the drawing by entering the view number. The view should be a number between 1 and 8.

ASI Path - AutoCAD stores the path to the database file as a Symbolic Path which must be resolved by lookups in a file called "ASI.INI". WebLook will resolve this path and hand the real path to your application as the Tag Resolved Path if the ASI.INI can be found.

Circle Smoothness - WebLook renders circles as a series of straight lines also called chords. You can vary the number of chords used to draw a circle by specifying a circle smoothness. The circle smoothness is actually the number of chords used to draw one quarter of a circle. The lower the number, the faster the generation time but the courser the circle. A good value for smooth circles is around 20. The default value of 5 produces fast circles that are of fairly good quality.

E. General Tab

The General Tab contains the options that may affect all image files. These include the initial zoom state of the image and any color preferences.

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Use Black Background - The default background color for the WebLook drawing window is black. To change the background to white, uncheck this option.

View Black & White - Display all color vectors as either black on a white background, or white on a black background, depending on the color of the background.

B&W Raster Contrast - This command will allow the user to specify four different settings from Lightest to Darkest.

Initial Drawing Zoom State - Zoom Extents will scale the image to fit the size of the drawing window. In the case of AutoCAD files, the extents used will be the extents stored in the AutoCAD drawing. WebLook will use the bounds of the bitmap as the extents for raster files.

Selecting the Last Saved / One to One option when viewing raster files causes the file to be displayed in an unstretched form; each dot in the file is represented by a dot on the screen. If you are viewing AutoCAD drawings and want the drawing to be generated in the same zoom scale and position as it was last saved in AutoCAD, check this option.

Layer Configuration Directory - You may use our FastLook product to create and save any configuration of new layer settings. You may then use this as your Default Layer Configuration.

Pickbox Size - You may adjust the sensitivity of the pickbox size in the Configuration section of the Configuration dialog box located under the Options menu. A graphical representation of the size of the pick area is provided. To change the pick area, simply use the scroll bar above the picture of the pickbox.

F: Printing Tab

Many aspects of the printing of drawings and images may be controlled from the WebLook Server. The Printing tab allows you to map pen colors to line widths. This feature works only with vector drawings.

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Default Line Width - Selecting None to use no PCP file will cause WebLook to use the Default Pen Width for printing all Vector files. The Default Pen Width edit box becomes active when None is selected. Enter the width, denoted in inches, in the edit box. This will change the value of the Default Pen Width for subsequent prints.

G: Print Stamping Tab

Print stamping is where a header and/or footer are printed on the printout every time a drawing or image is printed. The header and/or footer may contain date, time and user information, along with a customized message.

In addition to standard print stamping, WebLook may also be configured to apply a Warning stamp when a redline file is present.

The instructions for defining both are identical. The Warning Stamp is to be configured using the top half of the tab and the standard Text Stamping the bottom.

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The Warning Stamp is to be designated in only one of the six positions and will take precedence over the standard Text Stamp. All six positions are supported for the standard Text Stamp, excluding the one used by the Warning Stamp, if so designated.

To create a Stamp

- Check the box next to the type of stamp you wish to create. Un-checking the box will disable stamping.
- Select a Position on Printout such as "Upper Left" from the dropdown box labeled. Each position on the printout may be independently set.
- 3) The font may be set for each position by selecting the Choose Font button.
- Select whether you wish the background for this stamp to be Transparent or Opaque.
- 5) Type any text you wish to print in the Stamp Text edit box. You may wish to include one of the stamping variables in the text string. To do so, simply press the Insert Stamping Variable button and choose the desired variable. A variable may appear in any position in the string.

Variables:

Date – The date on which the drawing is printed. This is based on the date on the server.

Time – The time the drawing is printed. Based on the time on the server.

Path – The actual path to the drawing on the server.

Filename – The filename of the drawing, not including the .ifl designation.

H: Redline/Linking Tab

If you have the purchased the Redline Module, it will be automatically installed with the main server, but you must define various Redline options. WebLook also has the ability to utilize Link files from our FastLook Plus product. A short explanation of each is offered below.

Note: The ASP.NET interface will display FastLook redline entities, but does not have the capability to create the redline entities. The ActiveX interface does have the capability to create redline entities.

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Redlining

Redlining is accomplished on the client machine through the use of the Redline Client (redcli.dll). This DLL will be automatically downloaded as a user enters Redline Edit Mode if it is out of date or doesn't exist on the client's machine.

In order to be sure that a user does not overwrite the redlining from another user, each user will have his own separate redline file and will need to login to redline. The user will have to be in the list of users and be given Redline Edit permissions in order to be able to mark up a drawing. This is because the user name is used in the creation of a unique name for the actual redline file. If two users are allowed the same login name, they will be editing the same redline file.

The requirement that a redline user logs in does not preclude the use of the Anonymous Access option. In this scenario, no user will be asked to login when only viewing. They will receive the rights assigned to the Guest account. When an action is taken to initiate a redline session, i.e. choosing Edit Redline from the menu or issuing the appropriate command in script, the Login Dialog will appear and force a login. Therefore, anyone that you wish to allow redlining privileges must have a user name and password assigned.

Once a successful login is attained, the WebLook Server will give the WebLook Client a base redline file to act as a template to be placed in the WLRED sub directory of the user's Temp directory. Each user will be given a different redlining file name to use for a given drawing.

The file name will have the structure:

DrawingName_UserName.RED.

For example, a user named KEVIN who is marking up the drawing COLUMBIA.DWG would be assigned a redline file name of COLUMBIA_KEVIN.RED.

The WebLook Server knows about all saved files for a particular drawing and displays all redline files to any user that has View Redline turned on. A user will only be able to edit his own redline file and will not be able to affect any other user's markups.

The Administrator must specify a directory on the server to contain the redline files. This will be where WebLook will create and save all redlines.

All changes to the file will be done locally and are only saved to the WebLook Server when the user elects to Save Redline To Server from the client-side context menu.

Linking

Linking gives you the ability to create graphical "Hot Spots" on a drawing or image, which allows an end-user to click on it and view another file that has been associated with it. FastLook Plus must be used to create the links. WebLook can then be configured to use the FastLook created link files. Both the ActiveX and ASP.NET interfaces will use FastLook links.

IV. Clients-side: ActiveX Component

WebLook includes an ActiveX control that communicates with the WebLook Server. This allows you to view drawings and images directly in a browser or an application such as Visual Basic.

There are two distinct methods for invoking the WebLook client. The first is to simply call the WebLook server from the Address Bar of the browser or from an HREF.

Example: Type <u>http://IP_address/drawing_name.ext.ifl</u> in the Address Bar or create a link <A HREF="<u>http://IP_address/drawing_name.ext.ifl</u>">TEXT

The second method is to add an <OBJECT> tag markup to a Web page. This method embeds the WebLook client in an HTML page and allows you to place other HTML elements on the page. Using a scripting language such as JavaScript or VBScript, you can customize an interface and use WebLook functions such as the display, redline and printing controls.

Example: Use a graphic image or a <Button> element for a Print button and when a user clicks the button image, a print command is sent to WebLook's client control. The user will now be presented with the print dialog to print the currently viewed drawing.

A. Testing the Server Installation

WebLook provides an easy method to test the server after installation. After the minimum configuration settings are done, run the WebLook server and type the following in your web browser's address bar:

http:// IP_address/updateclient.htm

This will cause WebLook to serve a web page that will contain the correct component for your particular browser. Follow the directions presented on the web page. The server is functioning correctly when the image appears on the page.

B. Automatic Client Update

Kamel Software makes the latest WebLook components available on our website for your convenience. Please visit our website at www.kamelsoftware.com to download the latest WebLook ActiveX, Plug-In and support DLLs.

If you place a newer WebLook client component on your server, the WebLook server will automatically notify a client that a newer component is available the next time the client accesses the server.

Follow the steps below to update the client on your server:

- 1. Download the client component from the website.
- 2. Shutdown the WebLook server.
- 3. Copy the component into the WebLook program directory.
- 4. Restart the WebLook server.

The WebLook server will now notify any user that accesses it that a new client is available. If the user elects to install the new component, the server will send the same

UPDATECLIENT.HTM file referenced in the previous section. The user will then follow the directions contained on the page to complete the update.

If the user elects to not update at this time, they will be asked to update on subsequent sessions.

C. Purpose of the .IFL Extension

A browser uses file extensions to determine what plug-in or ActiveX to call to view a file type that it does not support. In order to tell the browser to use the WebLook Plug-in or ActiveX, we have chosen to register the extension "ifl" with the browser.

NOTE: You do not have to rename your files to use them.

Simply add the extension "ifl" to the current file name and extension of your link or embed. For example, Columbia.dwg will be referred to as columbia.dwg.ifl in the link or embed. The file will remain on the hard drive as Columbia.dwg. If the WebLook Client (plug-in or ActiveX) is in place, the "ifl" extension will cause the browser to pass the URL from the link or embed to the WebLook Client. The WebLook Client will initiate a conversation with the WebLook Server on the URL provided, and the WebLook Server will know to strip the "ifl" extension off the file name before trying to locate the file from the server to view.

D. ActiveX Integration

For Internet Explorer, we provide a CAB file (weblook.cab) that will automatically perform the installation and registration of the ActiveX from within Internet Explorer if it is referred to as an object on your HTML page. An example of the HTML code is displayed below:

* Any application that supports ActiveX controls, such as Visual Basic, Visual

C++, Microsoft Access, and so on.

Using WebLook Methods through VBScript

To extend WebLook's ActiveX functionality on Internet Explorer, you first embed the source file in an HTML page with the <OBJECT> tag:

In the <OBJECT> tag, the ID parameter identifies the embedded drawing window for reference by VBScript parameters. You can then use VBScript to issue WebLook commands to control the drawing window. The following example shows a simple form that provides a Print, Zoom Extents, and Layers button for the embedded presentation.

The Zero-Client web interface is a ready-to-use web application that allows you to easily publish your drawings to the web and allow your users to view and print with only their native browser. To utilize this interface you must publish the Interface folder in IIS. Please follow the steps below to configure.

A. Publish in IIS

The files for the WebLook Zero Client Interface are located under the WebLook program folder in a folder named Interface-IIS. To utilize this interface, copy the folder to your web server and publish the folder in IIS. The file named Main.aspx is the front page of the web application and as such is the file your users should access in their browser. All other folder and files located in the Interface-IIS folder are support files for the application and must remain for the application to run correctly.

B. Configure Web Application

Run the WL_InterfaceConfig.exe, located in the Interface-IIS folder, to configure the web application. Below is an explanation of each of the tabs of the configuration utility.

B1. Connection Tab

The Connection Tab is used to link the web application to your WebLook installation.

Root Drawing URL - The Root Drawing URL is the complete URL to the WebLook server including the port number if applicable.

Communicate Via – Choose whether to have the WebLook Zero Client Interface communicate to the WebLook server through either standard HTTP protocol or through Named Pipes. If you are using Named Pipes, you must refer to the Site Name that you used in the WebLook configuration.

Default Login – If you have elected to password protect the WebLook server and you plan on having all users of the WebLook Zero Client Interface login using the same account; enter the User Name and Password. The WebLook Zero Client Interface will then use this User Name and Password to automatically login.

If you wish to have each user login to individual accounts, leave these text boxes blank. WebLook will automatically prompt the client to enter the login when they access the Main.aspx.

Allow Navigation Panel – The Navigation Panel consists of a number of tabs to easily access files and features. It is designed to slide out from the left side of the interface. You may elect to not display this panel in its entirety by unchecking this option or disable the individual tabs.

Allow File Tab - The File Tab allows the user to browse folders to locate and view files.

Allow Views Tab – The Views Tab gives easy access to layouts, sheets and stored views.

Allow Layer Tab – The Layer Tab presents a list of layers or levels of the currently viewed drawing.

Allow Toolbar – The Toolbar is presented at the top of the window and contains icons for the most commonly used tools.

Allow Status Bar – The Status Bar is located at the bottom of the window and displays feedback to the user.

Default Drawing – Enter the relative path and file name of a file you wish to be presented to every user upon startup.

Default Window Size – Specify the default size for the DrawingWindow.aspx. This only applies if you are using DrawingWindow.aspx independently from Main.aspx.

Use Sound – Deliver sound feedback to user when a data pick is unsuccessful. This is only applicable for IE users.

Use Cookieless Sessions – If you have the need to eliminate the use of Cookies on your site, this option will embed the session data into the URL.

B3. Control Drawing Extensions for File List

Specify the list of file extensions to be presented in the interface. The user will access this list by pressing the File Types Button on the Files Tab.

Extension – Enter the extension in the box labeled Extension. This entry is not case sensitive and may or may not contain the leading dot.

Description to Display – This is the actual text that the user will see after pressing the File Types Button.



Include "All Files" entry – If this option is checked, All Files will be included in the list of extensions. The user choosing this will cause the File List to be filled with the names of all the files located in the target folder.

Default Selected Extensions – All filenames with the extensions listed in the box will be displayed in the File List. For example, if you wish to display only files with the DWG extension, type dwg in the box. If you wish to display DWG and DGN files, type the two extensions separated by a comma, like dwg, dgn.

Note – Choose these setting carefully. Keep in mind that the larger the page size and the higher the quality level, the larger the print file will need to be. This will certainly affect the time to create the file on the server, transfer the file to the client machine and how long it takes for the client machine to send it to the printer.

C. Details for Web Developers

The WebLook Zero-Client interface may be customized by using the following parameters. You may use either the POST or the GET methods to pass these parameters.

The two tables below outline the parameters, the values expected to be passed and an example using the GET method for each. You have the ability to pass multiple parameters to obtain the look you desire.
